## MOMENTS YOU CHANGED THROUGH GIVING IN 2015

### Area of Greatest Need

Donations designated to the area of greatest need allow Roper St. Francis to fulfill the immediate needs of our patients, teammates, facilities and community. One such need that your unrestricted gifts from 2015 helped us meet is providing technology for our Maternal Fetal Medicine Center at Bon Secours St. Francis Hospital.

Roper St. Francis has long been one of the region's best and preferred places to deliver a baby, welcoming some 3,100 babies annually to this world. But before now, we have not been fully equipped to serve the 10% of families who face high risk pregnancies and need specialized maternal fetal medical (MFM) care. In addition, the demand and need for MFM care in the region is higher than the resources presently available. Through your generosity, we were able to purchase specialized, advanced ultrasound equipment with fetal echocardiography to help meet this need and ensure mothers and their babies are receiving the best care possible.

### YOUR GIFTS ARE... *advancing maternal fetal medicine.*

"Having the Maternal Fetal Medicine Center at Roper St. Francis has allowed us to take care of expectant mothers who would otherwise have to leave their own physician they have grown to know and trust. The goal of managing any pregnancy, especially a high risk pregnancy, is optimizing the outcome for both the mother and her baby. We are grateful for the donations that have allowed us to provide the latest in ultrasound technology so we can monitor the development and growth of babies in mothers who are at risk for pregnancy-related complications."

### YOUR GIFTS ARE... *giving peace of mind to expecting parents.*

John was elated when his wife told him they were expecting their second child. "We scheduled our first doctors' appointment and nothing could have prepared us for the surprise we received," said John.

"We had our first ultrasound and they told us we were having twins! We left the office both shocked and surprised. However, we did the worst thing you can do, which is to go home and research 'having twins' on the Internet. Immediately, we were overwhelmed by all the complications that can accompany a twin pregnancy."



At their next visit, Dr. Dillon recommended that they start having ultrasounds at the Maternal Fetal Medicine Center at Bon Secours St. Francis Hospital. With John's wife Anne being over 35 and their identical twins sharing a placenta, Anne would need special monitoring with ultrasound technology at the center.

"I cannot begin to describe the anxiety that comes from knowing you have a complicated pregnancy," said John. "Drs. Dillon and Robinson and the technicians at the Maternal Fetal Medicine Center, however, were there with us the whole way. They provided guidance and reassurance and really took the time to explain what was going on. More importantly, it was obvious from the beginning that they had the technology and training to guide us through the pregnancy. It was a godsend."



Anne delivered at 34 weeks, which is not unusual with twins. Luckily it was an uneventful birth but the twins had to be rushed to the level II nursery. "We hoped to have the opportunity to immediately 'bond' with our girls like we did when our son was born, and the staff was wonderful in making sure we saw them right away," said John. "They were unbelievably accommodating, giving Anne a place to stay for the next two weeks so she could be with the babies. They taught us how to hold them and how to navigate all of their tubes and monitors."

Today, Anne, John and the girls are doing great, and they are grateful for the care and comfort they received during their pregnancy.

### Creating More Tomorrows at Roper St. Francis Cancer Care

The scope of cancer care is changing, with four out of five patients now receiving their care in a community hospital setting. Through your generosity, as Charleston's only community-based cancer program, Roper St. Francis Cancer Care is able to address this growing need by treating more than 4,000 patients with commonly diagnosed cancers annually.

We are also proud to be recognized by the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer, which awarded Roper St. Francis Cancer Care a Gold-level Commendation—the highest level of accreditation, which only seven percent of nationally accredited programs achieve. Your support allows us to excel in our commitment to excellence because you are helping us to launch important new programs like the Donna Fielding Cancer Wellness Institute.

In 2015 thanks to the support of our community, we celebrated the opening of a dedicated space for the Donna Fielding Cancer Wellness Institute. Patients and their families now have a special place where they can seek support during their cancer journey. This unparalleled resource led by our wellness and nurse navigators helps coordinate services for cancer patients throughout Roper St. Francis and the community, including therapeutic massage, disease-specific support groups, legal clinic services, survivorship education, music therapy, exercise and nutritional classes.

### YOUR GIFTS ARE... giving access to specialized care.

Abe Keating had been diagnosed with cancer and was under the care of a neuro-oncologist at another hospital when that doctor moved out of town.

"Luckily my surgeon, Dr. Artur Pacult, told me about a new program at Roper St. Francis. I was fortunate that Roper St. Francis Cancer Care is now in a partnership with the Levine Cancer Institute. I have had the opportunity to be treated by Dr. Ashley Sumrall, who is a leading neuro-oncologist specializing

in head and neck cancers. She has been wonderful and has brought me a comfort during this difficult time, and the nurse navigators have been so supportive as well. It's not easy to get through this. The massage therapy has helped with my neck pain and my overall recovery during my treatments.

I have friends and family who have all been treated at Roper St. Francis, and we all feel the same way—we are in good hands. When I tell people about this place I get excited because I don't know where I would be without it. I have been very impressed by the coordination of care. No one wants to be on this road, but if you are on it, Roper St. Francis Cancer Care is the best place to be."

## A TRIBUTE TO KEN BURGER

For many Roper St. Francis patients and teammates, Ken Burger was more than a well-known author and *Post & Courier* columnist—he was a friend and mentor.

In 2007, Ken was diagnosed with prostate cancer, and this would ultimately not only have a profound impact on his life but the lives of many in our community with the same disease. Ken said when he was first diagnosed, “I was scared to death, but through writing about it and through readers from across the state who reached out and shared their experiences with me, that fear dissipated.”

Ken then transformed what had been fear into a passion for helping others. He spent countless hours visiting other prostate cancer patients at Roper Hospital, giving them comfort and support. “Through his personal involvement as a lay navigator for our cancer program, Ken generously shared his wisdom and experiences with our prostate cancer patients and had a major positive impact on the prostate cancer patients’ experience at Roper St. Francis,” said Dr. Steve Akman, medical director of Roper St. Francis Cancer Care.

Ken and his wife Bonnie also initiated a writing class at Roper St. Francis, to help recently diagnosed cancer patients express themselves through writing. “The response we received was amazing,” recalls Bonnie. “The class became a place of healing for many people in our community. I will never forget, we had a new mother who was just diagnosed with stage 3 breast cancer. Her husband was away in the military and she wanted to expand her social group. Our writing class became a support group for her, and we were so thankful that it helped her through that difficult time.”



In May of 2015, the Roper St. Francis Foundation and Roper St. Francis Cancer Care honored Ken by naming and dedicating the Burger Consultation Room on the 7th floor of Roper Hospital. This not only honored his visits and writing classes with patients, but the more than \$400,000 that has been raised to date through the Ken Burger Prostate Challenge Golf Tournament (now called the Burger Memorial Challenge). “Ken loved talking to people and getting to know their story,” said Bonnie. “He looked forward to the golf tournament every year because he enjoyed visiting with the golfers who were supporting such a great cause.”

*Ken Burger’s legacy will continue to live on at Roper St. Francis, and we are grateful for the undeniable mark he has left on our healthcare system and community. “I think Ken would want everyone to remember to always be happy,” said Bonnie. “After all, that is how you define your success in the end.”*



### Roper Rehabilitation Hospital – Wendy and Keith Wellin Neuro Stroke Unit

Through your generosity, Roper Rehabilitation Hospital will now be able to achieve its vision for an enhanced space for neurology and stroke care. As one of the only facilities in the state with CARF accreditation, the demand for neuro stroke services has been higher than the clinical team has been able to accommodate. Roper Rehabilitation Hospital has had to turn down an average of 150 patients a year who need inpatient acute care rehab. Thanks to your support, the third floor of Roper Hospital will be transformed to the new Wendy and Keith Wellin Neuro Stroke Unit to help accommodate this growing need.

The Wendy and Keith Wellin Neuro Stroke Unit will feature the addition of 14 private rooms with the latest technology available for neuro and stroke patients. A large, state-of-the-art rehabilitation gymnasium will include private therapy areas so patients can undergo treatment while still maintaining their dignity. The space will also include an independent living apartment that will feature a kitchenette, living space and regular bedroom furniture. This will give patients the opportunity to practice the skills they need so they can feel comfortable and safe when they return home. A family lounge for caregivers will also be an important part of the unit, so family members can have a place to rest while remaining close to their loved ones receiving care.



### YOUR GIFTS ARE... *giving hope to stroke patients and their families*

“Roper St. Francis means a lot to me personally because it’s so integral to the Charleston area. I am continually impressed that Roper St. Francis devotes its own time and treasure to improving the state of healthcare in our community. It has been rewarding, both through philanthropy and through my service on the Roper Hospital Board, to help Roper St. Francis in any way that I can in these important efforts.”



The neuro stroke program at Roper Rehabilitation Hospital resonated with me because my family has a history of stroke-related diseases. My grandparents suffered on both sides from the effects of stroke, along with my mother and father during their lifetimes. A stroke not only has a disabling effect on a person but an emotional effect on the caregivers. When my father had a stroke, he remained in a paralyzed condition for five years and my mother was his caregiver until he passed. I have seen and understand firsthand the emotional toll this has on a family.

I am proud to support the new Wendy and Keith Wellin Neuro Stroke Unit at Roper Rehabilitation Hospital because I want to be a part of giving hope to stroke patients and their families. This program is a worthwhile endeavor that deserves to be supported through philanthropy. ### YOUR GIFTS ARE... *creating miracles.*

Philip Floyd was home when he suddenly suffered what is often called a widow-maker heart attack. “He was rushed to the hospital where he coded several times,” recalls his wife Rhonda. “The doctors came out and told me that he wouldn’t survive. At that point we were just trying to keep him alive long enough for our daughter to get here from Florida to say goodbye.”

Philip was put in a medically induced coma and miraculously, he started to recover. However, as he came out of the coma, a blood clot caused a massive stroke. “Philip was a very healthy, active person. We were head-long into our life and this changed everything,” said Rhonda.

As a pastor, Philip served on many mission trips, but now he needed to be served. When he was admitted to the Roper Rehabilitation Hospital, he couldn’t walk and needed to relearn everyday tasks like brushing his teeth and washing his hair. “They let me stay with him in his room,” said Rhonda. “We’d just celebrated our 40th wedding anniversary before this happened, and all I wanted was to be there for him and with him. Many nights I crawled into his hospital bed and slept with him,” said Rhonda. Spending so much time with him in the hospital also helped her learn how to better care for Philip when he came home.

During his three weeks in the Roper Rehab Hospital, Philip made incredible advances. “I’m a type-A personality, and I appreciated being pushed by the therapists,” said Philip. “My goal was to walk. I entered rehab in a wheelchair and exited walking on my own,” he said.

Today, Philip and Rhonda have recently welcomed two new grandbabies. They are enjoying spending time with them and each other, along with a renewed outlook on life focused on letting go of worry and being joyful.





### Nursing Scholarships and Education

Excellence in nursing is one reason why Roper St. Francis leads the Lowcountry in patient satisfaction. We know that well-trained nurses are vital to the health and safety of our patients and to continually achieve national distinction for quality care, Roper St. Francis must stay focused on excellent patient safety and outcomes.

Over the last three decades, Opal has served as a role model for nursing at Roper St. Francis. She was the first Urology Certified Nurse at Roper Hospital and has led other nurses to pursue this level of excellence. 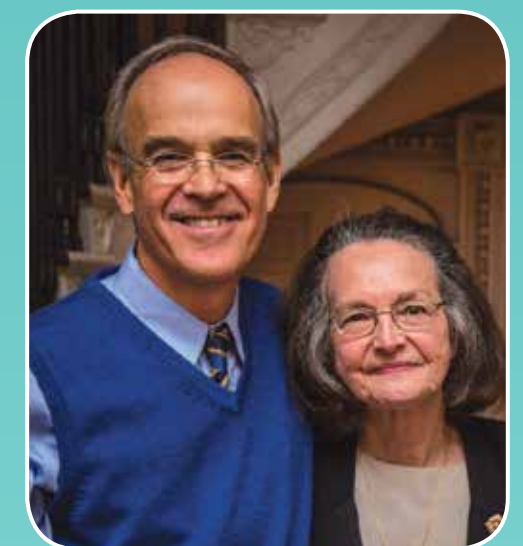

## GRANTS: Navigating Patients to Care in 2015

Each year, grants from governmental agencies, foundations, non-profit organizations, and corporations help make every moment matter for patients across the Lowcountry. Grant awards large and small have a profound impact on the lives of patients who benefit from the services provided by departments across the healthcare system, from supplying lifesaving AED equipment to funds that provide women access to free breast screenings.

In 2015, Roper St. Francis received a substantial grant that will allow Roper Hospital to be better prepared for any future threat of natural disasters. In addition, the Ryan White Wellness Center and AccessHealth Tri-county Network have continued to focus on helping chronically ill and disadvantaged clients get access to the right healthcare.

### FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program: *Increasing access to care in natural disasters*

Hurricanes, tidal surges and flooding have been part of Charleston's history since its founding. People in the coastal area of South Carolina however are recognizing the threat of a major category storm and the challenge of adequately and safely evacuating our ever-increasing population. Historically, the South Carolina Department of

Health and Environmental Control (SCDHEC) has allowed key facilities to request to support "shelter in place" versus evacuate in the event of a hurricane. In 2014 DHEC upped the ante on facility recommendations to include the requirement that critical systems like the hospital's fire pumps and backup generators must be located above flood elevation.

Thanks to the dedication of the Roper Hospital Physical Plant team and the Roper St. Francis Foundation Grant's department, Roper Hospital has received two awards to move these critical systems to higher ground.

"We are very pleased that local, state, and federal government agencies have recognized the importance of our shelter in place project," said Matt Severance, CEO of Roper Hospital.

"Working together, we can make sure that Roper provides the critical shelter in place access our patients may need during adverse and challenging times."



### The Ryan White Wellness Center: *Helping people with HIV/AIDS in our community*

In 2015, grant funding through the Foundation helped 725 residents of the Lowcountry with HIV receive access to specialized care. In addition, the Ryan White Wellness Center was able to enroll 81 new patients, giving them access to essential medical care, case management and other supportive services as well as housing and health insurance assistance.

*"I was so nervous about seeing an HIV doctor for the first time. I was diagnosed with HIV at the health department and they helped me get enrolled with the Ryan White Wellness Center. Even though I was so scared, they really made me feel like family. They reassured me that my disease was treatable and that I could live a healthy life. I even met a peer navigator who was also living with HIV. They explained everything to me in such a caring way. Now I'm not afraid anymore, my life is back on track, and I am healthy and happy."*

The Ryan White Wellness Center also began its PrEP initiative in 2015. PrEP, or pre-exposure prophylaxis, is a biomedical intervention that prevents the transmission of HIV by use of a once daily medication, taken by the HIV negative individual. The technique marks a new era in HIV prevention, which experts hope will reduce the 50,000 new HIV infections that occur across the U.S. each year. The Wellness Center is the first clinic in Charleston to provide open access to PrEP to patients regardless of insurance status.

**AccessHealth Tri-County Network: Community Collaboration for Greater Health Access for the Uninsured**

In our community, a startling 20% of our population lacks health insurance, which amounts to approximately 150,000 people at any given time. AccessHealth Tri-County Network was created through grants from The Duke Endowment and the Trident United Way to help our Lowcountry's low income, uninsured patients find a "medical home" where their primary care needs can be met.

In 2015, AccessHealth focused on sparking collaboration with community health and safety net providers to improve health outcomes for nearly 3,700 clients receiving services. In addition they were able to provide clients with care navigation services allowing ease of access to primary care and other supportive services in the community.

AccessHealth expanded their reach in the community by partnering with several primary care and safety net providers to build an integrated system of care for their clients. They were able to expand their community outreach by embedding enrollment and care navigation services at partner sites such as the Dream Center Clinic, TriCounty Family Ministries, Fetter Health Care Network and One80Place. This integration of services within partner sites has led to improved health outcomes and ease of access to services for clients. Roughly 1,000 new enrollments in the program as well as over 4,000 physician appointments came as a result of the collaboration.

## VALERIE'S STORY

"After my divorce, I had no options after being diagnosed with some major debilitating illnesses," said Valerie. "I was unable to work and I needed help. Prior to all these major life issues I had always worked/volunteered in my community to assist others in need. I never imagined I'd be on the other side of the fence when I arrived here in South Carolina three Easters ago. I almost lost everything including my life."

"The truth is that nothing else has any real meaning in life without your health. I feel very blessed to have a personal navigator through AccessHealth. I was presented with all of these informational packets and it was overwhelming. It was scary for me because I couldn't comprehend and put together the right questions to even get clarification. Words cannot express the weight my navigator took off my shoulders. So now on my third Easter here in South Carolina my basket is once again overflowing with blessings. I understand the direction I need to take and I am grateful my navigator helped me find the specialized care I need."



**Roper St. Francis HeartSave Program: Saving hearts, saving lives**

The HeartSave Initiative at Roper St. Francis provides essential AED devices, training and education to public, not-for-profit entities throughout the Lowcountry. A 2015 Institute of Medicine report showed that only 6% of cardiac arrest cases survive when they occur outside the hospital. Survival rates depend on fast response: how quickly cardiac arrest is recognized, 911 is called, CPR is started, and an AED is used. An AED or automatic external defibrillator is a small, portable electronic device used to restore normal heart rhythm to people in cardiac arrest.

Since 2006, this community health initiative has placed AEDs in more than 549 public locations throughout the Lowcountry including all of our tri-county schools. Placement included training community members how to properly use the devices and how to provide on-site cardiac pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and cardiac defibrillation. By South Carolina state law, every high school is required to have an AED onsite. To date, 100% of tri-county schools – Berkeley, Dorchester, and Charleston County School Districts – have an AED onsite supported by appropriately trained staff – a goal met entirely through the HeartSave Grant Program.

Championed since its inception by Charleston cardiologist William J. Grossman, MD, the HeartSave Program has filled the gap in AED provision, training and education in the tri-county for more than 10 years. Throughout the years, HeartSave has accounted for eight successful saves, including three children.

"Roper St. Francis, through the essential support of a grant from the Medical Society of South Carolina, donates approximately 30 AEDs to the community each year," said Dr. Grossman. "Our HeartSave program has become an emblem of our community commitment to preserving life, known throughout



the Charleston, Berkeley and Dorchester tri-county area. We should be supportive of such an endeavor that promotes nothing but the noblest consequence in all of our health efforts. We hope that one day an AED is just as accessible as a fire extinguisher; it's that important for increased survivability."

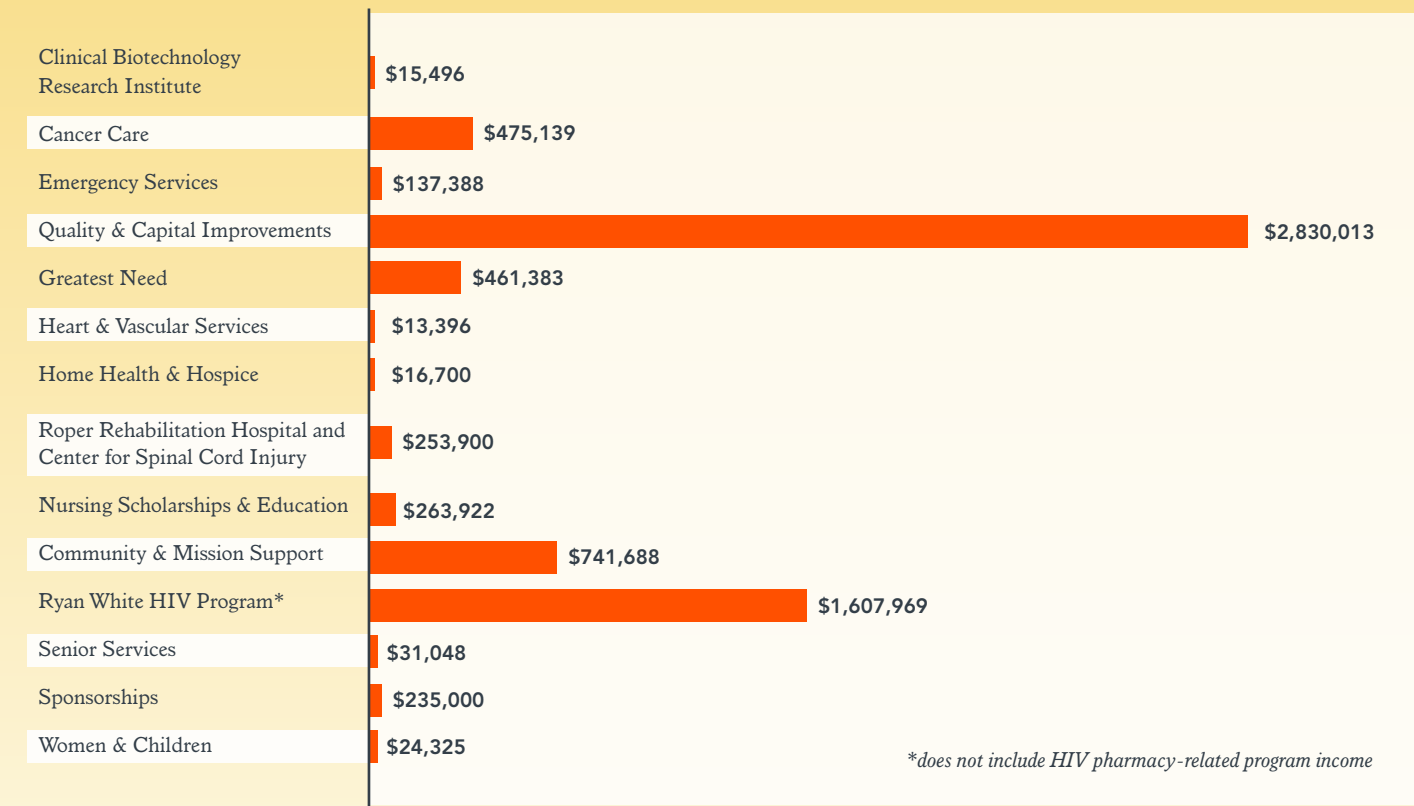
